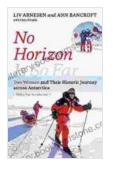
Two Women and Their Historic Journey Across Antarctica: A Tale of Courage, Perseverance, and Science

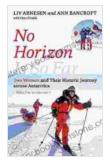
