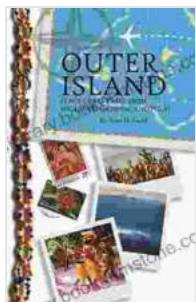


Unveiling the Enchanting Isles of Micronesia: A Peace Corps Journey to Chuuk and Pulap

Epilogue: The Enduring Legacy



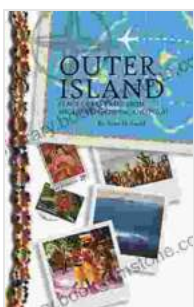

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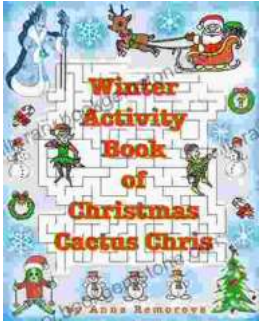
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
